


7 Days - Traffic Accidents & Traffic Stops






7 Days – DUI Arrests and Public Intoxication Labeled by the Hour of the Day





Tevin Reams was promoted to on-site supervisor. Tevin is supported by the regional team of Rodney Barnes (General Manager) and John Meek (Regional Vice President) and Municipal team of Laura Lierz and Isaiah Mouw.

The Municipal team has established biweekly touch-base meetings with the ParkCasper team. The purposes of the meetings are to share best practices and provide any assistance to the ParkCasper team.

In addition to the biweekly meetings, corporate plans to visit quarterly to ensure best practices are being followed and to provide on-site support to the ParkCasper team.

FIRST AND CENTER SURFACE LOT

Maintenance

REEF Regional Vice President John Meek met with City Officials to perform a walk-thru of the parking facility. Recommendations were made to enhance the appearance and drainage of surface lot.

Signage

REEF will consult with the City of Casper on replacement signage for the First and Center parking facility.

Monthly Permits

The prior operator provided a list of monthly permit holders. REEF made all efforts to contact permit holders with the information provided by the prior operator. The prior operator indicated an occupancy rate of 95%. This is inaccurate as roughly 30% of permit holders terminated their permit agreement back in the spring when stay at home orders were issued.

Eight-five (85) percent of the permit holders were paying \$35.00/month for their parking space. The permit rate posted for the First and Center parking facility is \$43.00/month. REEF honored the price of \$35.00 for the month of September. As of October 1, 2020, the permit fee is \$43.00/month.

Five parking spaces are allocated for snow storage during the winter months. Monthly permits cannot be sold during the winter months as parking cannot be guaranteed due to weather.

Permit Statistics

Permit occupancy is at 68%.

- · 40 parking spaces are sold
- . 13 parking spaces are available for rent
- 5 parking spaces are unable to be sold during winter months

Enforcement

Warning notices are being issued to vehicles that are parking at the First and Center parking facility and do not have a valid parking agreement with REEF... If an unauthorized vehicle continues to park at the First and Center parking facility, a monetary parking notice may be issued. The fine is \$25.00 for each parking notice. If payment is not received within 15 calendar days, a late penalty of \$25.00 is added to the parking notice.

3 warnings; can appeal if necessary

First and Center has a total of 58 parking spaces. After discussions with on-site staff, we were informed space numbers 27, 31A, 37, 45 and 50 are reserved for snow storage in winter months. We are unable to sell these spaces in the winter months resulting in a loss of revenue of around \$1,290 annually.

DOWNTOWN GARAGE

Maintenance

REEF on-site staff are performing multiple inspections daily of the garage. Permit holders have complained about the elevator outage and requested alternate parking arrangements until the elevator is fixed.

There are lights out on the top floor of the garage. The lights are most likely out due to vandalism. REEF has seen a recent increase in vandalism (specifically graffiti). A few permit holders have indicated they are no longer comfortable parking in the garage due to the vandalism.

The installation of additional security cameras will help with identifying people vandalizing the parking facility.

REP issued by City Engineering, due 12/4/2020

Signage

REEF will consult with the City of Casper on replacement signage for the Downtown parking facility.

Monthly Permits

The prior operator provided a list of monthly permit holders. REEF made all efforts to contact permit holders with the information provided by the prior operator. The prior operator indicated an occupancy rate of 87% for covered spaces and 44% for uncovered (rooftop) spaces. This is inaccurate.

* Decals are no longer being issued.
License plate readers are used instead,

Nearly 25% of permit holders were paying the secondary permit rate of \$35.00/month when they should have been paying the primary permit rate of \$43.00/month. The permit rate posted for the Downtown Garage is \$43.00/month for the first permit and \$35/month for each additional permit. REEF honored the price of \$35.00 for the month of September. As of October 1, 2020, the permit fee is \$43.00/month for primary permits.

It has been difficult obtaining permit holder information from the Wyoming National Apartments. The tenants do not see a need to register their vehicle since their parking is provided at no charge.

The Apartments Wanager has been helpful.

Permit Statistics

Permit occupancy is at 36% for covered parking spaces.

- 104 parking spaces are sold
- 116 parking spaces are available for rent
- 69 parking spaces are allocated for hourly parking

Permit occupancy is at 31% for un-covered parking spaces.

- 15 parking spaces are sold
- 43 parking spaces are allocated for Wyoming National Apartments
- . 33 parking spaces are available for rent

Enforcement

Warning notices are being issued to vehicles that are parking at the Downtown Garage parking facility and does not have a valid parking agreement with REEF. If an unauthorized vehicle continues to park at the Downtown Garage, a monetary parking notice may be issued. The fine is \$25.00 for each parking notice. If payment is not received within 15 calendar days, a late penalty of \$25.00 is added to the parking notice.

More hanketing/promotions

The prior parking operator allowed permit holders to park in designated hourly parking spaces. Warning notices were issued to vehicles that have a specific parking space but were parked in the hourly parking spaces.

No towing will occur without City approval; citations are turned over to a collection agency.

RECOMMENDATIONS

First and Center - Alternate Use Case

First and Center has a total of 58 parking spaces. After discussions with on-site staff, we were informed space numbers 27, 31A, 37, 45 and 50 are reserved for snow storage in winter months. We are unable to sell these spaces in the winter months resulting in a loss of revenue of around \$1,290 annually.

REEF is considering offering a \$35 rate for these stalls with the ability to park in the garage when snow occupies the stalls.

Downtown Garage - Monthly Permit Fee

It is REEF's understanding the secondary permit fee is available to an individual or organization when multiple permits are desired.

Example: An individual has 2 vehicles and a permit is required for each vehicle or a company is paying for their employee permits.

The transition from the prior operator to REEF has uncovered the secondary permit rate extended to individuals with a single vehicle, but because there are other individuals from the same organization, the secondary permit rate was extended. The organization is not paying for the permits.

REEF would like to recommend the City adopt one of the following options

- 1) Define a secondary permit fee is only available when the individual or organization is paying for all desired permits.
- 2) Remove the secondary permit fee and make all permits the same price of \$39.00/month. The proposed rate is the average of the primary and secondary permit fees.

Downtown Garage - December Parking

It was recently brought to REEF's attention the prior operator did not charge for parking for the month of December. This information was not shared during the RFP process. The revenue share calculations were based on 12 months of permit revenue.

REEF would like to offer 2 hours of free parking to hourly parkers December 21 – 24, 2020. (The 2 hours of free parking is per vehicle per day.)

Downtown Garage - Maximum Daily Rate for Hourly Parkers

REEF is unable to locate documentation for the maximum daily rate for hourly parkers. REEF would like to propose a maximum daily rate of \$12.00/day. (M-F) previously \$500.

Downtown Garage - Hourly Parking Equipment requests.

REEF would like to recommend a gateless revenue control solution for the Downtown Garage. Referenced

In the last few years, we have seen more large-format facilities opting for multi-space pay station configurations rather than gates. The motivation for decision-makers is based on price savings and ease of use for all user groups.

As it relates to ease of use, a pay station configuration delivers a free-flowing traffic pattern that will never experience any kind of backup, as entry and exit are not dependent on the proper functioning of the parking equipment. In a hypothetical scenario at Downtown Garage where the pay station is not functioning there is always a parking payment app to collect payment. Therefore, potential losses are completely mitigated. Pay stations are also much simpler to fix, so any downtime is promptly resolved with plug-in components.

A pay station operation does operate on the "honor system" and requires effective enforcement to ensure payment compliance. In our experience, effective enforcement does not translate to constantly issuing violation notices. The intent is to have a visible presence that compels public parkers to pay through the pay stations, as it is not worth risking a monetary parking notice.

License Plate Recognition


Fixed license plate recognition (LPR) can assist identifying violators and track key performance indicators in the garage. Cameras are installed in the entry and exit lanes. LPR offers a variety of benefits including tracking actual occupancy and frequency of visits.






